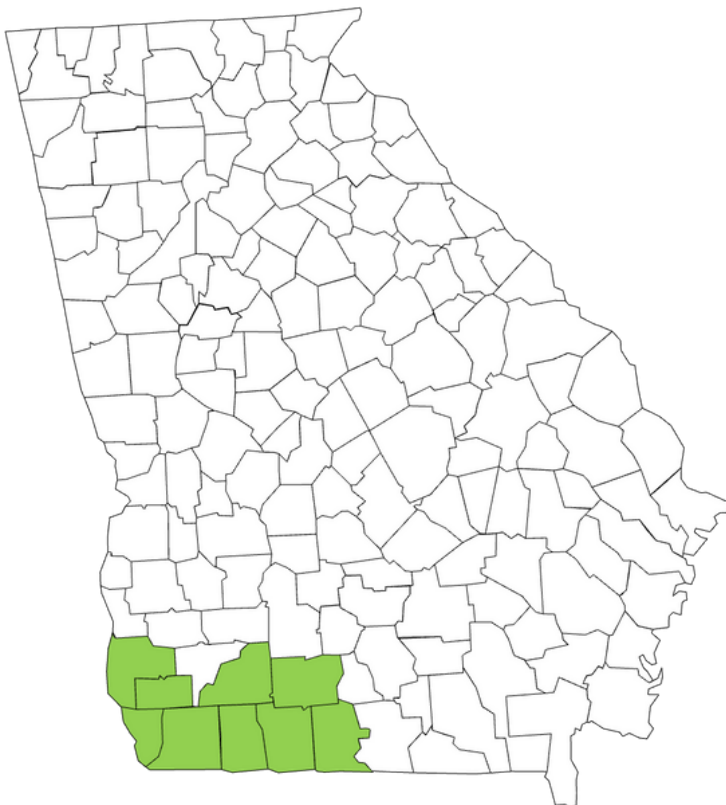

HOW WILL THE MENTAL HEALTH PARITY ACT IMPACT ME?

The Mental Health Parity Bill (HB 1013) was successfully passed in March 2022 with resounding bipartisan support and aims to expand access to affordable mental health treatment and behavioral health services across the state of Georgia. The new law now requires health insurance plans to cover mental health conditions in the same manner in which physical conditions are treated. In accordance with the law's passing, patients can no longer be denied medically necessary treatment for mental health conditions.

In order to understand individual health plans, each consumer should review their **Summary of Benefits and Coverage (SBC)** and the **Summary Plan Description (SPD)** written in each plan.

If a consumer feels as though they have experienced a parity violation, they must first discuss the issue with their insurance provider and determine if it is necessary to file a formal appeal. If the issue is not resolved by the insurance provider, the following state agencies are responsible for enforcement of parity in Georgia: **The Georgia Office of Insurance and Safety Fire Commissioner (OCI)**, and **The Georgia Department of Community Health (DCH)**.

*The state is responsible for the monitoring and enforcing of parity for private insurance plans, including individual, marketplace, small business, and large employer plans that are not self-funded. Note that large, self-funded corporate ERISA plans are regulated by the US Department of Labor (See **<https://www.dol.gov/agencies/ebsa/laws-and-regulations/laws/mental-health-and-substance-use-disorder-parity>**.) Also note that federal parity law does not apply to Medicare.

REPORTING BY OTHER PERSONS

Ann. Code § 19-7-5

Any other person who has reasonable cause to believe that a child has been abused may report

INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITY TO REPORT

Ann. Code § 19-7-5

If a person is required to report child abuse because that person attends to a child as part of the person's duties as an employee of or volunteer at a hospital, school, social agency, or similar facility, that person shall notify the person in charge of the facility, or the designated delegate thereof, and the person so notified shall report or cause a report to be made in accordance with this section. An employee or volunteer who makes a report to the person designated shall be deemed to have fully complied with this subsection. Under no circumstances shall any person in charge of such hospital, school, agency, or facility, or the designated delegate thereof to whom such notification has been made exercise any control, restraint, modification, or make other change to the information provided by the reporter, although each of the aforementioned persons may be consulted prior to the making of a report and may provide any additional, relevant, and necessary information when making the report.

STANDARDS FOR MAKING A REPORT

Ann. Code §§ 19-7-5; 16-12-100

A report is required when:

- A reporter has reasonable cause to believe that child abuse has occurred.
- A person who processes or produces visual or printed matter has reasonable cause to believe that the visual or printed matter submitted for processing or producing depicts a minor engaged in sexually explicit conduct.

PRIVILEGED COMMUNICATIONS

Ann. Code § 19-7-5(g)

A mandated reporter must report regardless of whether the reasonable cause to believe that abuse has occurred or is occurring is based in whole or in part upon any communication to that person that is otherwise made privileged or confidential by law. However, a member of the clergy shall not be required to report child abuse reported solely within the context of confession or other similar communication required to be kept confidential under church doctrine or practice. When a clergy member receives information about child abuse from any other source, the clergy member shall comply with the reporting requirements of this section, even though the clergy member may have also received a report of child abuse from the confession of the perpetrator.

HOW TO REPORT IN GEORGIA

Georgia law requires anyone who works or volunteers at a child-serving agency to report suspected child abuse or neglect within 24 hours (O.C.G.A. 19-7-5). Frequently hospitals, schools and other facilities have an internal child abuse report protocol. You should be aware of this protocol and follow it.

PROFESSIONALS REQUIRED TO REPORT:

- Physicians, physician assistants, residents, interns, hospital and medical personnel, podiatrists, dentists, or nurses
- Teachers, school administrators, school counselors, visiting teachers, school social workers, or school psychologists
- Psychologists, counselors, social workers, or marriage and family therapists
- Child welfare agency personnel (as that agency is defined by § 49-5-12) or child-counseling personnel
- Child service organization personnel (includes any organization - whether public, private, for-profit, not-for-profit, or voluntary - that provides care, treatment, education, training, supervision, coaching, recreation programs, or shelter to children)
- Law enforcement personnel
- Reproductive health-care facility or pregnancy resource center personnel and volunteers
- Persons who process or produce visual or printed matter

DISCLOSURE OF REPORTER IDENTITY

Ann. Code § 49-5-41

Any release of records shall protect the identity of any person reporting child abuse.

Critical Access Hospital (CAH) designation is given by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to rural hospitals located at least 35-mile away from another hospital, with no more than 25 beds, providing 24/7 emergency care services.
